



Important Information Regarding Your IP Address Assignment

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1 Status of Assigned IP-Addresses

Any IP addresses assigned to you will have the status PA (Provider Assigned) and can be used whilst you purchase an eligible Internet Service from Arelion that entitles you to public IP address space. This is according to RIPE policies, which can be found [here](#).

As the IP address assignee, you also need to be aware of the following:

- The assigned address space must be returned to Arelion when the eligible service connection is terminated.
- The address space cannot be taken over by another operator.
- The address space cannot be used, transferred, or given away to any third party/other organization.

As public IPV4-addresses are a limited resource, operators have to be restrictive when it comes to assigning these to customers according to RIPE rules and regulations.

NOTE: assigned IP-addresses can only be used in AS1299

2 DNS Announcement

All public IP-addresses should be announced on the Internet. This works through reverse lookup. Reverse lookup is the way a host verifies that the visiting computer, the IP address trying to connect to you, is valid. The host verifies the IP Address, using a DNS server, which confirms that the IP address the visiting computer communicates is valid. The confirmation is received from the computer hosting the IP-Address through so called announcement.

IPv4: Standard announcements provided for IPv4. When you are being assigned public IPv4 addresses from Arelion, your IP addresses will by default be announced with standardized names.

IPv6: Standard announcement is not provided for IPv6.

3 Reverse Lookup. IN-ADDR.ARPA for IPv4 Subnets

If you have been assigned a smaller subnet your configuration needs to follow the example below:

You have been assigned a network with 128 addresses. Eg. 192.36.73.0 – 192.36.73.128. The subdomain is then 0-25.73.36.192.in-addr-arpa, where 0 is the

start address for the assigned range (0=127) and 25 is the number of ones in the subnet mask.

You should create a zone file for 0-25. 73.36.192.in-addr.arpa and enter NS and PTR-records as follows:
